



NEWS FROM NATIONAL

From Rummage Box - Cruising & Playing The Radio By Phillip Cole VP of Publications

Maybe it was Chuck Berry who best described the joy of driving an automobile when he sang, "Cruising and playing the radio. With no particular place to go."

At least since WWII, the radio has been an integral part of the freedom offered to us by the automobile. In the early '90s I tried to describe "cruising & playing the radio" to a visiting English friend, he couldn't comprehend it. It was Friday night. So, we walked to downtown LincoInton, N.C. where there were hundreds of teenagers cruising in their cars. This prompted 2 questions from the Englishman: "What is the purpose of all this?" & "Why do they play their radios so loud?" When I tried to explain that it was a unique part of American culture thanks to "freedom of the road", he smiled & said, "Well, all these young people sure seem to be enjoying themselves!"

I grew up "cruising & playing the radio". The year I was born was when the 45 rpm record was introduced by RCA Victor. The year I learned to drive the 8-track player was becoming the big thing. I still have a box of 8-track tapes in the garage, the player hanging under the dash is long gone.

Let's share some important events in our history of cruising and playing the radio:

In the 1920s & 1930s in-car radios were being introduced. They were expensive, adding about 25% to the price of a Model A. The top song of 1930 was "Happy Days Are Here Again".

In 1952, even though practically all stations were broadcasting in AM, the first in-car FM radio became available thanks to Blaupunkt. The top song was "Blue Tango".

In 1963 vacuum tubes were replaced with transistors & car radios became "solid state". The top song was "Surfin' USA".

In 1965 8-track players became available. Over the next several years 8-track players were added to many cars. The top song was "Wooly Bully".

By 1969 cars added stereo to their sound system, where the tuner amplified two channels, not just one. The top song was "Sugar, Sugar".

In 1970 companies like Alpine & Pioneer sought to solve our problem of the 8-track player eating up the tape with cassette tapes. With the advent of cassette tapes, we could now play "my music" thanks to a "Mix Tape". The top song was "Bridge Over Troubled Waters".

By 1982 Bose offered the first Premium Stereo System teaming up with GM's Delco to offer it as an option in Oldsmobiles, Buicks, & Cadillacs. Top song was "Physical". By 1984 Sony introduced an in-dash CD player. The top

song was "Careless Whisper".

Now, buttons and dials have been replaced by touch screens and Bluetooth. If you don't know what that is, ask your grandchildren. Then, take them on a cruise in your "old car". If it has a radio, let them turn it up loud...



As we are ending the season for events and tours, I look back to my first president's message in the Spring.

In that first message I said that I hoped to see many more in 2024. Thankfully, that statement proved to be true. We had a good turnout for Spring, a better showing for Summer, and, until we had two cancellations, Fall Tour originally had 43 registrations.

I am encouraged that we are beginning to have more folks turn out, including some first-time members.

Also, during the year we needed and passed a dues increase to \$20.00. Even so, that will still not cover the ever-increasing cost of printing the Spark Plug, even as Cindy Robish has tried every trick in the book to cover expenses. I want to sincerely thank her for the spectacular job she has done for all of us.

I really believe that in the near future we will have to look at more ways to increase the Ohio Region treasury.

FALL TOUR 2024 CARS, STARS, PUMPKINS, AND MORE BY SHIRLEY PAYNE

WESTERN RESERVE CHAPTER

Fall Tour was held October 18-19 at the Holiday Inn Express in Madison, Ohio, a venue we have used before.

Friday's early bird tour featured a 16.5 mile round trip drive, featuring 12 of the area's nearly 30 wineries. People had a map, and could choose which one(s) they would like to visit.

The evening's event saw us try something different—a pumpkin decorating contest featuring painting, add on features such as eyes, wigs, and other décor, but no messy carving. The people seemed to enjoy it, and there were many very good results.

Saturday dawned sunny and bright, and the day's tour showed off splendid Fall colors. Our first stop was in downtown Painesville at a local landmark, Joughin's Hardware Store established in 1877, and having an entire rear section featuring many old, old items from the original store. This store is two stories, and you could find anything you needed. Alex Heyd found some small batteries that he had looked for, for many years. It turned out that they were also the last pack in existence.

Our second stop was at the Ferroni Brothers Museum in Willoughby, where one museum was an older fire station, with two floors filled with real cars and model cars, and signs and memorabilia of all descriptions. The Ferroni brothers were very big in drag racing in the early 1960's. Since the other buildings were across a now very busy 4-lane road, we enlisted the Willoughby Police Department and a squad car to direct people across the street. These buildings had their repair garage, filled with cars, and the main building, which housed many, many early hot rods and custom cars, from the 1950's and 1960's, including two early Ford custom roadsters that were nationally featured in 1961 Rod and Custom Magazines.

The third stop was also in Willoughby, at the Wm. Ruple Antique Ford Collection. We toured this building many years ago, when there were about 40 Fords from Model "T's" to a 1953 hardtop. After Mr. Ruple passed away, the collection was taken over by his sons and daughter. We did not know what to expect when we arrived. We were absolutely astounded to find nearly 110 Fords, Mercuries, gas pumps, and signs, including many rare neon signs. We were given a talk about the collection by one of the sons. This has turned out to be one of the premier Ford collections in the Country.

Our lunch stop then followed at St. Marks Lutheran Church in Chester Township, hosted by our members, Ray and Ellen Gilbert.

After lunch we toured back into Chardon, Ohio for a fascinating tour of 2 buildings where Rolls-Royce and Bentley cars are completely restored. One building is for engines and drivetrains, and the other is for body restoration.

Leaving there, we toured to Montville, Ohio, for a tour of Nassau Park and the building housing the giant telescope that was formerly housed in the Euclid area, until all the development and lights drove the building out to a much more dark and rural area.

The last stop was one mile away at Observatory Park. When entering the large round room, all the lights are turned off, and the entire ceiling becomes an unbelievable display of the entire Universe, and all the stars, and how in sequence each constellation acts with each other throughout the night sky.

The evening banquet concluded with our featured speaker, Mr. Kit Whipple, speaking about all the cars manufactured in Cleveland, Ohio, followed by our Chinese Auction and 50/50 Raffle.

All in all, our members really stepped up and pitched in.

NEW BUSINESS:


Audit Committee assigned - Denny Robish & Alex Heyd will review the books.

* A small organ was in the Hartzell house. It was originally in that house, then removed. Children from the local school saved pennies to get it back!

* Did you know if a pirate has an earring in this left ear, this means he crossed over the equator.

A big thank you goes out to Charlie & Maggie Wilson for planning this tour of Alliance. Not only did we learn about these 2 historic houses but had a great lunch at the College Inn.



Who was Siegfried Marcus and what did he have to do with the automobile? His story is at the bottom.

It was a strange year, lots to cover, so let's start with August. We normally have a car show & a meeting at Debonne Winery in Madison. It's one of the largest classic car events in Northeast Ohio & a long way away from Florida, so what happened? Hurricanes Debbie & Ernesto hit Florida then tracked all the way up to Maine. The call was made to cancel the show because the weather forecast was for torrential storms, wind, rain, & hail, the whole shebang. Some brave souls went to the venue to turn people who showed up away if anyone showed. Well, for some reason, 65 (not the 250 to 300 we normally expect) came. Three trophies were handed out, there was wine, food, music, & thunderstorms. Well, everyone got a free (rain) car wash & had a wet but good time.

Ahh, the September meeting is the one I have been waiting for a long time. A nice driving tour of our covered bridges with historical summaries by "tour guide" Dave Payne. Then came the "Piece De Resistance". The part I have been waiting years for, the famed "Hobo Stew". Everyone brings some kind of vegetable to the meeting place before the tour for Shirley take home while they are touring to add to the stew pot, that was already being cooked over a wood fire in a big cast iron pot. The result was delightful.

October was the Fall Tour.

November meeting was held at Mangia Mangia (an Italian word that means eat). We had an impromptu 90th birthday party for member Dwain Rakes. Out to the parking lot to view 2 meticulously restored Volkswagen trucks rebuilt by Craig Seabrook (yep, the guy that hand manufacturers MG bodies & components). These models are rarely seen in the U.S. To me, the most unusual part of the pick-up was the tailgate & bed sides folded down for easier loading. Truly German ingenuity.

Well, we finally made it to the last meeting of the year. We held our meeting in an inn/museum called the Steele Mansion in Painesville. The building was originally built as a 3 story mansard roof home for George Worthington Steele & his family from 1863 until 1867. The back half of the house, the servant's quarters were occupied in 1867. The Steele family called the mansion home until 1917. During that time

the home was visited by Presidents Hayes, Garfield, & Grant. The mansion was sold to Lake Erie College in 1921 where it was used as the college's president home in the front & student's housing in the rear. Because of an accidental fire on the roof, the mansion had severe damage. The current owner's husband bought the burned out hulk of a building in 2010 & surprised his wife with a plan to rebuild it, after it had been stripped & vandalized for 9 years. Well, in the 14 years since the purchase, the house/ inn has been rebuilt back to the "French Second Empire" style as close as finances & building requirements would allow. The result of these trials, tribulations, & successes is a beautiful venue for weddings, anniversaries, club functions or just tours.

Our January meeting was held at a restaurant called the "Little Pie Shop". Lots of room, good food, great waitresses, & a quiet enough to hold a meeting, our Chapter's new slate of officers was announced, & they conducted the meeting. Welcome aboard President Scott Johnson

Okay, so who was Siegfried Marcus and what does he have to do with cars? Siegfried's first "car" was a simple motor vehicle powered by an atmospheric engine he designed and built in 1870. The flywheels were the rear wheels, no clutch or transmission, someone had to lift up the rear end & spin a wheel to start it. No steering, no brakes, but it could run down the road. This was the first vehicle propelled by petrol. After running it up and down the road and making a lot of noise in Vienna, Siegfried took his vehicle apart & worked on other things for a while. Low & behold, Karl Benz made his first attempt at a successful motor car in 1885. With his "Benz patent motorwagon". Siegfried made his second "car" in 1888/89. It had steering, brakes, and a clutch. Much better. Siegfried also invented an ignition magneto, a carburetor, an electric lamp, a stethoscope, & a firearm that could shoot 30 bullets a minute.

So why is Siegfried such a hidden figure? It seems that he was a German & Jewish man living in Vienna, Austria. Adolf Hitler found it completely unacceptable that this man was credited with anything & he ordered all statues, plaques & books referring to Siegfried be destroyed & his 2nd car disassembled & burned. The car was hidden in Vienna and preserved. It was driven in a parade in Vienna & is now in a museum.





COMMODORE PERRY

Apr. 9, 1939-Sept. 5, 2024 Marjorie Ann Polivka Strom was born April 9, 1939 in Bellaire, Ohio to Albert and Anna Stella Vild Polivka. Marji was graduated from Ohio University, where she also met George Strom. They

met while singing in choir and shared a love of music for the rest of their lives. After marrying George March 18, 1960 and graduation, Marji moved to Elyria, Ohio, --George's hometown--and they lived there until moving to Knoxville, Tennessee in May 2023 to be near family. They both still cherished Elyria and were its best cheerleaders.

Marji loved children and teaching. She taught in elementary schools for 32 years and spent almost her entire career teaching third grade at McKinley Elementary School in Elyria. Because she understood the troubles and travails of childhood, one of the books she loved reading to her students was Alexander and the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day (Judith Viorst). She also loved spending time with her nieces, nephews, and great -nieces & nephews. She was a great storyteller as well as a fact-checker/history resource for George.

Marji and George were very involved with the Lorain County Historical Society (LCHS). They became members of the Lorain County Historical Society in February 1961. They were highly dedicated to preserving history, and especially supportive of the work of LCHS in Elyria and Lorain County. Marji served as recording secretary of the Board for several terms in the 1960s and 1970s. was a Board member from 1997-2008, and was programs chair from 2000-2008. She was a member of many LCHS committees throughout the decades, including those pertaining to events, membership, governance, and education. She was known for her volunteer time spent with the Women's Committee, the LCHS Apple Festival booth, third-grade tours of The Hickories, history camps, Valentine Teas, annual membership dinners, Ice Cream Socials, and fall BBOs. Marji had a passion for teaching others about Lorain County history, and her presence in Lorain County and with the LCHS will be missed.

She also helped George with his antique car hobby, especially when he was president of Elyria's antique car club and president of the Ohio Region of AACA. Marji was also a member of the United Presbyterian Church in Elyria where she enjoyed singing in the choir for many years with George and other friends.

Marji was preceded in death by her parents; and later by George, to whom she was happily married for 63 years.

She leaves behind to cherish her memory her sister, Carol Weiss; sister, Barbara (David) Omerod; brother, Alan (Percan) Polivka; and many nieces, nephews, great-nieces, great-nephews, and even great-greatnieces and nephews --all scattered throughout the United States.
