



MARCH MEETING

What a wonderful presentation Rita Albright gave us about the Titanic! I'm going to try to hit some of the highlights.

Did you know:

- The ship was 882.6 feet long. That equivalent to 4 city blocks!
- There were 9 decks.
- Thomas Andrews designed the ship down to the number of screws needed for the hat hooks in each stateroom. (For those of you who know me...my question is "Do you think he had a spreadsheet?")
- The middle propellor is 17 feet in diameter and weighed 22 tons, the outside propellors were 23 feet and weighed 38 tons.
- There were 4 stacks.
- It could hold 3,300 passengers, but there were around 2,200 on board including 900 crew members. This included 324 first class passengers, 284 second class, and 709 third class who were mainly immigrants.
- Eight officers were on board and only 4 survived. Captain Smith did not survive.
- There were four collapsible and 10 Lifeboats that, at capacity, would hold 1,178. When Titanic was designed by Andrews, he included 20 lifeboats and 4 collapsibles. 10 were removed because Ismay thought they interfered with the ease of the first-class passengers and were unsightly. There were 10 lifeboats and 3 collapsable boats. That's only enough for 1,100 passengers.
- The Titanic was also a mail boat. There were 3,360 bags of mail on board. All were lost!
- The lookouts in the crow's nest didn't have binoculars. They were locked in a cabinet and the person who had the key was reassigned before sailing and took the key with them. The iceberg wasn't spotted because of this. Only 37 seconds after a crew member in the crow's nest announced seeing the iceberg the ship hit it.
- Bruce Ismay was on board and insisted that Captain Smith increased Titanic's speed to 24 knots to beat the Carpathia's speed record, so the Titanic was traveling faster than normal.
- William Carter had his 1912 Renault on board. The family survived but the car didn't. We laughed that the engine got flooded!
- Most passengers froze to death, they did not drown. The water temp was 28 degrees. 32 degrees is lethal.
- Carpathia rescued 700 men, women and children, 1,517 perished.

In 1996 Rita and her husband, Kendal (Bill) Haines went on a cruise expedition to raise a piece of the ship's hull. Buzz Aldrin (the astronaut) was part of the dive team who went down to try to salvage a piece. Unfortunately, it fell from the chain that was attached and sunk back down. They had to call off the mission due to an upcoming hurricane. They were on the cruise ship with Eleanor Shuman Johnson, who was 18 months old when she was on the Titanic. Her mother and her brother, Harold, were placed in collapsible and all survived. This was the only other time she was out to sea. Imagine how she must have felt being that close to the wreckage.




